## Re: BC Renal GN Formulary switching from Rituxan<sup>®</sup> to a biosimilar rituximab (Riximyo<sup>®</sup>)

Dear Colleagues,

In August 2020, our partner organizations BC Cancer and BC PharmaCare switched from the originator rituximab (Rituxan<sup>®</sup>) to one or all of the available biosimilar rituximabs in Canada (Riximyo<sup>™</sup>, Ruxience<sup>™</sup> and Truxima<sup>™</sup>). BC Renal will accompany this initiative and match the funding approach from BC Cancer; therefore, BC Renal will only reimburse Riximyo as of **October 30, 2020.** 

One reason for this change is that Rituxan accounts for between 20 to 25% of the entire annual expenditure for the BC Renal Glomerulonephritis Formulary. Across Canada, \$241 million was spent on Rituxan in 2016, making it one of the top 10 highest biologic expenditures in the country.

Savings from changing coverage to Riximyo will be reinvested into other treatments for patients with kidney disease. Please be assured the rituximab biosimilar agents have undergone rigorous testing to ensure their mechanism of action is equivalent to Rituxan.
