## **INTRODUCTION**

Integrating a palliative approach to care in conjunction with high quality nephrology care is essential for all people living with chronic kidney disease (CKD). It is a holistic approach where all team members have a role including family members, therefore all care providers in CKD need to understand how to support a palliative approach in all areas of kidney care. Integrating a Palliative Approach to Care (IPAC) in CKD is overall care that helps those living with CKD alleviate pain, symptoms and stress while receiving treatment with the primary goal to improve quality of life for both the patient and the family as they navigate their renal journey. A palliative approach with ongoing discussions is essential for comprehensive care of individuals to ensure CKD care addresses what is important to them to enhance their quality of life. Individuals who have these conversations with their clinicians about their values, goals, and wishes are more likely to receive the care they want, feel less distress and report better quality of life.

Building on the End of Life (EOL) framework, BC Renal engaged in an Integrative Palliative Nephrology project to enhance the capacity of renal health care professionals and embed a palliative approach for those with advanced CKD by changing culture, sharing knowledge, and developing resources to support clinicians. Resources were co-developed with patients who



understood the complexities across the multi-faceted renal journey and included a multitude of perspectives encompassing cultural diversity, health literacy and diverse geographical settings. These resources are available at www.bcrenal.ca along with additional links to resources from vetted reputable sources.

Some individuals progress in a fairly predictable patterns through these stages, others may shift more rapidly through some areas. Once in End Stage CKD, folks may transition between multiple modalities of renal replacement therapy including transplant, PD, HD to Home HD along with hospital stays for acute illness. As renal care professionals, we provide education, care and support to patients and families along this journey.

## Strategies to maintain competence and confidence levels in Integrating a Palliative Approach to CKD Care

- Attend at least one ECHO session annually (60 minutes-- interactive and recorded)
- Register for a palliative newsletter (Centerpointe)
- Attend education sessions on IPAC from BC Centre for Palliative Care
- Be aware of the renal journey, listen and respond to patient cues for discussions
- Bring a palliative approach to care to team discussions

### 3. Post Hospitalization/ Dialysis Complications

"You have just been in the hospital. I've noticed that things have been getting more difficult for you. In light of that, this may be a good time to discuss what is most important to you if you are getting sicker. Is that OK?"

"How did this hospitalization change your understanding of the future of your health? How have things changed for you recently? What is your understanding of what lies ahead?"

#### 4. Dialysis Access Issues

"You just had some setbacks with your dialysis access/had your dialysis access fixed, so if its OK with you I would like to discuss your goals and preferences."

"What is your understanding of what lies ahead with your dialysis and overall health?"

#### 5. Dialysis Withdrawal Consideration

"I understand you have been thinking about whether you want to continue dialysis. Is it OK for us to discuss your goals and preferences so we can think about this together?"

"What is your understanding of what it means to stop dialysis?"

#### **2.** Dialysis Initiation

"As you begin dialysis and settle in to the routine, it's a good time to discuss/review your goals and preferences. It's been  $\underline{x}$  months since you started dialysis, which is a good time to discuss how things are going and review your goals and preferences. Is that OK?"

"How has starting dialysis or being on dialysis affected your life? What is your understanding of what lies ahead with your dialysis and overall health?"

### 1. Chronic Kidney Disease/ Pre-Dialysis

"As we start to think about options and preparations, it's a good time to discuss your goals and preferences. Is that OK?"

"How much do you know about your kidney disease and what it means for your health and Quality of Life?"







## Starting the Conversation: Exploring Key Concepts Throughout the Dialysis Journey

#### Serious Illness Conversation Patient Tested Language
